- Yes. The Ventura County Watershed Protection District (VCWPD) is the applicant for the two Project components described in this proposal (giant reed removal, well installation at Foster Park) and is a local public agency. Appendix E of the 2005-06 Consolidated Grants Program Guidelines defines a Local Public Agency as any city, county, city and county, or district.
- The Ventura County Flood Control District was originally formed in 1944 (Chapter 44 of the Statutes of the 1944 Fourth Extraordinary Session) to address the flood protection and water supply needs of Ventura County residents. In September 2002, AB2320 (Chapter 564, Statutes of 2002) statutorily changed the name of the Ventura County Flood Control District to the Ventura County Watershed Protection District to more accurately reflect the mission, programs, and services provided by divisions within the District.
- Yes.
- On June 5, 2001 the VCWPD and the USACE entered into a Feasibility Cost Share Agreement (Agreement) for the Matilija Dam Ecosystem Restoration Feasibility Study. This Agreement defined the study approach, activities to be accomplished, schedule and associated costs of the Feasibility Study. The Project Management Plan (PMP) was an attachment to the Agreement and represents a contract among the study participants and describes, in detail, the agreed-upon scope of work and funding allocations for the Feasibility and the implementation phases of the Project. On July 12, 2005 the VCWPD and USACE entered into a Design Agreement and initiated the Design phase. This phase includes detailed planning, engineering, and design of the 12 Project components, including those described in this proposal (giant reed removal and well installation at Foster Park).
